

Invite participants to sit at a table of their choosing. Notes to facilitator:

- This 30 minute session introduces, for retreat #5 and retreats #6 & #7,
   "Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace" as an overarching theme or wholistic understanding of the mission initiatives.
- Two objectives for this 30 minute introduction:
- 1. Introduce "Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace"
- 2. Time for participants to experience safe space to share.



The essential question for this session: (3 minutes)

How do we receive, embody and share the fullness of Christ's Peace with one another and our neighbors?

#### Share these statements:

- Retreats 5, 6, and 7 will explore Christ's invitation as being "Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace."
- Just as the five mission initiatives are wholistic and inextricably inter-connected so is Christ's invitation to peace. It inextricably inter-connects: "receive" "embody" and "share."
- Each of you received, by email "Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace," now in your handouts. We encourage you to read and refer to it from time to time.
- One way to grasp Christ's mission is by the way Jesus engaged his disciples. He first invited people to receive his invitation, "Come follow me." Then he lived with his disciples and taught them to embody the gospel by trusting and living in God's Kingdom. Then Jesus began to teach and direct his disciples to go, to witness and share his invitation to all. Although receive— embody—share—Christ's peace are broad strokes or patterns, they give an indication of how we are to be engaged in Christ's mission.

## Share these four points regarding "Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace:" Slides 5-8

1. Receiving and sharing Christ's peace is a continuous dynamic of receiving and learning to trust the good news of God's love, fully lived and revealed in Jesus in Christ, then the invitation goes beyond just being received, it is to be embodied or incarnated in us as disciples and as a community, and shared for the sake of the world.



2. It is imperative that we fully explore and live into what it means to receive, embody, and share Christ's invitation or we will bypass the spiritual revival so desperately needed in our individual lives, congregations, and neighborhoods.

3. Receiving and sharing the "invitation" is the entry point through which we move deeper into relationship with God and others, see more clearly our mutual poverty, and intentionally turn toward new life in Christ in covenant with God and one another.

4. Remember we are to create safe space for our congregations and its members to experience disruptive encounters of the Holy Spirit so that questions can be asked, new ministries envisioned and offered.





## Participants sit at a table of their choosing.

**Share the following affirmations and Essential Question:** (4 minutes)

- Christ's mission—our mission—our inviting people to Christ—emerges
  out of and is strengthened by <u>encounters</u>—our encounters—with the
  Living Christ.
- The mission initiative we are exploring this weekend is "Inviting People to Christ."
- A key to personally inviting people to Christ is <u>personally</u> getting to know the Christ we are committing our lives to so that we can generously share Christ's invitation with others.



## The Essential Question we want to explore is:

Distribute "Reflection Guide—Who is Jesus to Me? Receiving Christ's Peace" with this request:



## Show video "Who is Jesus to Me?" by the following steps: (5 minutes)

- 1. Inform participants that our approach to seeing the video "Who is Jesus to Me?" is similar to "Dwelling in the Word."
- 2. Ask participants to listen for a word, phrase, image, feeling or idea that resonates.
- 3. On page \_\_4\_ of "A Guide—Receiving Christ's Peace" is space for you to note your reflections.
- 4. Show video "Who is Jesus to Me?"



**Refer participants** to the "Reflection Guide—Who is Jesus to Me? Receiving Christ's Peace" page \_4\_\_ to note words or phrases as they reflect on "Who is Jesus to Me?" (20 minutes)

Provide participants, in groups of three, opportunity for each one to share and discuss their personal reflections about "Who is Jesus to Me?" (18 minutes)

<u>In large group provide discussion by following these steps:</u> (10 minutes)

- 1. Affirm that in every LCM retreat we have remembered that mission begins with encounter... Mission begins with God... Mission is radically relational, as revealed in Christ, who shares life, intimately with us and our neighbors.
- 2. Affirm that it is in Christ that we are confronted with the generosity of God's love.
- 3. Pose this question for large group responses: What was it like to be asked "Who is Jesus to Me?"



- As leaders of mission we are to be awake to encounters where God's activity and God's invitation to Christ's mission are discovered.
- Why is this so important? It is in these disruptive encounters that we see what could be in our daily interactions with others!!

## Share these affirmations: (2 minutes) Next 4 slides

## **Cultivating Readiness**

 As missional leaders our challenge is to work with others to cultivate the soil of expectation and readiness to encounter and receive the Living Christ.



**Share:** 

As missional leaders our personal commitment is to help create a congregational culture so that the congregation has opportunities for—encounters to receive the Living Christ.


Essential questions are important, they lead to a process of discovery- we discover who Jesus is-which leads us into interconnected relationship with Jesus and others.






## **Essential Question:**

How can I, in ways meaningful for me, receive Christ's invitation to a deeper relationship, new life, and wholeness?

Affirm: (3 minutes)

- One way to receive Christ's invitation is to simply take time and get to know the Christ we are committing our lives to.
- In this session we will not be engaging in doctrinal exploration or analysis on the nature of Jesus Christ or the Trinity.
- In this session we will experiment with practices to explore that which has eluded description throughout the ages—Receiving Christ's Invitation—something not fully explainable but utterly transforming.
- We are challenging ourselves to leave our doctrinal assertions at the door way of encounter and risk entering the sacred space of exploration where our concepts are not adequate and our feelings are too deep for words.
- We are challenging ourselves to move from an intellectualization of faith to an encounter with the source of that faith—the Living Christ who in this very moment waits for us.
- Each of us has found some ease or challenges in doing the missional practices. We keep missional practices before us as a "key" to open ourselves to encounter.
- There are many ways to do missional practices. Some of us set aside, with "regularity" a specific time and place to do a practice. Some of us do a practice in "little snippets" throughout the day to be awake to God's presence and invitation. We do not suggest a "best" or a "correct" way.
- In this session we invite all of us to be "disrupted" by exploring new missional practices in a "creative" spirit.



# Introduce and review an outline of the guide including a brief description of the six missional practices in the guide by the following steps: (10 minutes)

- Descriptions—Six Missional Practices: To Receive Christ's Invitation Below are brief descriptions of six missional practices that offer various approaches to being open to Christ's invitation while reflecting on a story of Jesus from the Gospels. Choose two missional practices to try during this retreat.
- 1. **Prayer of Examen: Receiving Christ's Invitation** to be awake to Christ's invitation in a story of scripture from the four Gospels and reflecting on your life as it unfolds each day.
- 2. **Imaginative Contemplation: Receiving Christ's Invitation**—to be awake to Christ's invitation by reading and imagining or placing one's self with Jesus in a story of scripture from the four Gospels.
- 3. **In Creation: Receiving Christ's Invitation**—to be awake to Christ's invitation in a story of scripture from the four Gospels and by being attentive to creation.
- 4. **Writing a Poem: Receiving Christ's Invitation**—to be awake to Christ's invitation in a story of scripture from the four Gospels and by reflecting on an experience from one's life and then writing a poem.
- 5. **Hymn Reading: Receiving Christ's Invitation**—to be awake to Christ's invitation by recognizing Christ's invitation in a story of scripture from the four Gospels and in reading a hymn that calls us to action.
- 6. **Craft Making: Receiving Christ's Invitation**—to be awake to Christ's invitation in a story of scripture from the four Gospels and as you do a craft, such as knitting, carpentry or gardening.





## (25 minutes)

- 1. Ask participants to choose two of the six practices.
- 2. Announce that 25 minutes is provided in this session to individually practice one of the two and that in the next session time is provided to practice the 2nd one chosen.
- 3. Encourage each participant, to find a comfortable or quiet place and take at least the next 25 minutes to practice one of the two chosen. For example, if the practice "Creation" was chosen, going to an outside setting may be good.
- 4. Remind participants, in a "creative" spirit, to try a missional practice of their choosing in this session, for the purpose of finding ways meaningful for them to receive Christ's invitation.
- 5. Announce that we will reassemble at 11:15 AM

Provide opportunity for large group questions or comments about their experience with their chosen missional practice. (5 - 10 minutes)



## Make the following points: (4 minutes)

It is out of the depth and overflow of this peace that we find the capacity to cope with life and to extend ourselves in the ministry of Jesus Christ in the world. - We have had a brief introduction to the "Guide—Who is Jesus to Me? Receiving Christ's Peace" and each of us has explored two missional practices.
- In the "Guide—Who is Jesus to Me? Receiving Christ's Peace" on page \_\_4\_ is space for each of us to make notes, while reflecting on the essential question:

## How am I making room daily to receive Christ's invitation to a relationship, new way of being, and new way of seeing?

• Whatever way you deem best could be one simply adopted from the guide, or you could choose several of the practices for variety of use at different times, or you could adapt or create a new missional practice.

Provide reflection time for each participant to consider how or what missional practice or "way" would be best. (10 minutes)

Invite participants to meet in triads for each one to share what and how they are considering a missional practice or "way." (15 minutes)



Each of us can create space and unhurried time to listen, to notice, to feel, to think, to be shaped and sent by the One, as a gift of grace, who beholds us, believes in us and calls us the beloved.



### **Notes to Facilitator:**

Prior to this weekend you were to read carefully "Receive, Embody, and Share Christ's Peace" This document provides an overview of invitation in the context of our mission. It is very important you are familiar with these concepts as you guide the sessions.

Also provided are individual sheets for each table that explore one of the dimensions of Christ's invitation. At the top of each sheet you will find a dimension of invitation (example: Embody) with a brief description and question for consideration by the table. Please distribute these sheets so each table has one sheet. You will provide directions below that will utilize these sheets in an activity.



The following talking points really get at the heart of Leading Congregations in Mission. Become very familiar with these points and make them your own so you can convey them with conviction.

## Share the following Talking Points: (7 minutes)

The essential question for this session is the same question we discussed this morning and will be considering for the next three retreats:

How do we receive, embody, and share the fullness of Christ's peace with one another and our neighbors?

- This morning we reentered what is a life long exploration. Who is Jesus to me and what does it look like be in relationship with him?
- These are truly essential questions for our time. Why? Because many have walked away from both Jesus and the church. Many have struggled with the way various groups of Christians have portrayed Jesus and sought to employ various forms of guilt and even fear to gain followers.
- Returning to our Missio Dei Video from Retreat 1, we humbly but boldly affirm the Word must become flesh in our lives, neighborhoods, and world! In our day and time there is desperate need for a fresh and exciting reintroduction of Jesus that conveys God's deepest longings to restore and heal all of creation. AND if WE are going to be the living Word made flesh we must intimately know the One who walked the dusty roads of Palestine, ate with outcasts, healed the sick, and invites us into a radical new way of life in this very moment!


## **Share:**

- As leaders of mission we must also reimagine what our congregational experiences might look like if we slow down and create more and deeper space to dwell with the living Christ in scripture, song, times of deep sharing, and opportunities for contemplation. In other words how do we together slow down and awaken our mind and heart to the Spirit that seeks to shape and send us in mission!
- We return to the big overarching essential question we asked in Retreat 2 during our introduction to <u>"Essential Questions": How do</u> <u>I/we specifically embody and live the concerns and passion of Christ</u> <u>with one another and our neighbors?</u> This is the question that takes us right into the heart of God's mission In Christ – how does the Word become flesh in us as the body of Christ in the world today?



## In PLT table groups please reflect on the following question: (15 Minutes)

How are your encounters with the living Christ in relationship with others disrupting you to consider deeper and even new ways of being the church (i.e. congregation)?



## Share the following question:

What insights are beginning to emerge that you are willing to risk sharing?

#### After table talk has occurred

Invite the large group to share insights they heard at their tables. (5 minutes)

Note: Be sure to affirm connections people are making to how they can become the Word made flesh in their congregations and neighborhoods.



### **Continue with the following points: (5 minutes)**

- As we explore "Invite People to Christ" this afternoon we will consider how this dimension of Christ's mission can come alive in us and our congregations. How does invitation begin to shape the very essence of who we are and what we are about as congregations?
- This afternoon we will explore three dimensions of our call to Invite People to Christ's Peace Receive the Invitation, Embody the Invitation, and Share the Invitation. These dimensions are modeled after the life and ministry of Jesus as he invited people from all walks of life to come, to follow, and to share the good news!
- Although our primary focus will be on the mission initiative Invite People to Christ we recognize when we invite people to Christ we are inviting them to all the dimensions of Christ's peace that a relationship with Christ represents. This includes invitation to Communities of Christ that together seek to abolish poverty, alleviate needless suffering, and pursue peace through healthy or righteous relationships (See D&C 163:2).



## Transition to the next topic by sharing the following points: (5 minutes)

- For the remainder of the afternoon we continue our exploration of Christ's invitation by going deeper into how we embody the invitation.
- You may recall in <u>Retreat 2</u> we introduced the idea that conversation is essential to mission. <u>Conversation as a missional practice creates and sustains safe space for cultivating new understandings, ways of being, and living Christ's mission.</u>
- We struggle at times to engage in conversation beyond a superficial level.



Show Video on Conversation and invite table groups into conversation around the following question (10 minutes):

Why is conversation so essential to fully living Christ's mission?

Continue with the following talking points: (5 minutes)



#### **Share**

Embodying Christ's invitation is first about how we create a safe and inviting space by the way we interact with others – by slowing down, being fully present and awake to the Spirit's movement in situations. It also occurs as we convey warmth by our genuine interest, invite meaningful conversation by our willingness to be vulnerable, and offer radical hospitality by freeing others to express more fully who they are and desire to become.

## **Share Video:**

Refer participants to the practice "Holy Curiosity for the Other" in the Practice Tab page 11 and share the following points: (5 minutes)

- Cultivating Holy curiosity is not only a practice but a personal discipline that requires us to hold in check our natural desire for affirmation and expression and focus solely on uncovering the story of another person.
- This practice is about how we meet people in the context of their lives and free them to express and even discover the essence of who they are and desire to become in presence of the Spirit.



This practice consists of four basic steps -

- 1. be prayerful,
- 2. ask genuine questions,
- 3. pause and reflect,
- 4. give affirmation, and follow the Spirit's lead.

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#### Share:

This practice consists of four basic steps – be prayerful, ask genuine questions, pause and reflect, give affirmation, and follow the Spirit's lead.



The focus of this practice is to first:

- create safe and inviting space
- through questions and reflective listening invite the other person deeper into sharing their story.

There is no particular right way do this practice it is about increasing our capacity to listen intently and ask genuine questions that lead to deeper understanding of another person.

There is no particular right way do this practice – it is about increasing our capacity to listen intently and ask genuine questions that lead to deeper understanding of another person.



The Spirit moves in our relationships in ways we do not fully comprehend. When we provide safe, inviting, and even prayerful space for another to share, transformative encounters with God and one another occur over time.



Invite Participants to partner up with another person (preferable a friendly stranger) and utilizing this practice see how far you can go in getting to know the other person in 10 minutes.

Remember this is more than simply interviewing the other person but making them feel comfortable and safe to share. Each person will have an opportunity to try this practice. You might begin by saying "So John, it is really good to meet you or see you again. I would like to get to know you. I'd be honored if you would be willing to share an experience or story that would help me know you better"

Refer in your Handout Tab page 2 to "Holy Curiosity for the Other – Suggestions" for help with this practice. (20 minutes – 10 for each participant to share)

#### **Share the following:**

We pause to reflect on our journey this evening. As the description for each step of the missional process is read, I invite you to reflect on your journey personally, as a PLT, and congregation. Where has the Spirit led you at this point on your journey?

Have the five people lined up before hand to slowly read the description associated with their process step based on the descriptions below:

<u>Encounter</u> – A divine stirring within provides the first glimpses of something deeper. The Pastor Leadership Team creates safe and sacred space for new questions, deeper conversations, and a holy unsettledness with the status quo.

<u>Discover</u> - The Pastor Leadership Team models and invites the congregation/small group into *missional practices and activities*. These help people move from vague questions and unsettledness to increasingly clear questions, conversation, and understanding of Christ's mission in their changing contexts for mission.

<u>Envision</u> - Leaders continue to cultivate safe and sacred space for emerging questions, conversation, and the <u>willingness to risk imagining and sharing new ideas</u>. From the questions, conversation, missional practices, and activities new insights emerge about what it might look like to "embody and live the concerns and passion of Christ" (Doctrine and Covenants 164:9d) in existing and new ministry contexts.

**Experiment** - As new ideas emerge, *missional experiments* are conceived and launched in pairs or small groups in prayer and expectation. The PLT continues to model and invite the congregation/small group into missional practices, conversation, and activities that lead to new insights and missional experiments. Special attention is given to matching the giftedness of all ages with missional experiments.

**Evaluate** - New ministries and experiments lead to new forms of missional life and the need to evaluate what matters most among competing priorities. Leaders utilize the congregation/small group's growing capacity to engage in meaningful conversation to discuss how structure, individual gifts, ministries, and activities can be oriented around a deepening understanding of Christ's mission.

<u>Renew</u> – The Pastor Leadership Team creates intentional opportunities to pause, reflect, process learning, celebrate, rest, and renew their commitment to an ongoing adaptive process of being shaped and sent by Christ's mission and emerging vision. Share:

Each step points to the next. During our first four retreats we have journey together to understand how *missional practices* help us slow down to *encounter* (God, each other and the neighborhood), *discover* (new insights about our contexts for mission), and *envision* (risk new inspired ideas or prophetic imagination). Tonight we want to invite you to share some of the stories that are emerging in your congregation. These stories help reveal where we find ourselves – as congregations – on this journey.



On your table each PTL has a set of five stones Each one is uniquely different just like each PLT.

Introduce and explain the Inukshuk stones on the tables, please acknowledge Tim Sundell as the creator of these sets of Inukshuk.

Facilitator invite four other people up to help put together your Inukshuk (modeling how it takes a team to put these together) explaining how each stone represents one of the missional process stepping stones.

Each stone symbolizes one of the missional process stepping stones. Inukshuk stones can symbolize how the missional process is one of the compass points that help us navigate into God's future. (Missional Process)

Inukshuk, pronounced in-ook-shook, are stone monuments erected in the image of humans. One of their purposes was to communicate direction in the harsh and desolate Arctic. As such they were a tool for survival, and symbolic of the unselfish acts of a nomadic people - the Inuit - who built them as signposts to make the way easier and safer for those who followed.

The hands of many and the efforts of an entire group were required to build these massive stone sculptures. They are the result of a consensus of purpose, of focused action by a group united in its goal and labour.


The Inukshuk are the product of cooperation, teaching us that as good as our individual efforts may be, together we can do even greater things.



#### **Share:**

- Each stone is a separate entity. Each supports, and is supported by, the one above and the one below it. No one piece is any more or less important than another. Its strength lies in its unity. Its significance comes from its meaning as a whole. What is true about the Inukshuk is true about people. Each individual entity alone has significance. As part of a team each of us supports, and is supported by, another. We are united by our common vision, and together we are part of a greater whole.
- Invite a member of each PLT to pick up each of the stones and unwrap them. Each PLT table has 5 stones wrapped in cloth.) Please be careful not to drop these stones for they are fragile and will bruise. This is just like how fragile we are as individuals at times. Hold on to your stone (if five is not enough stones at your table please pass them around the PLT.





### **Experiments and the Missional Process**

### Please share the following talking Points: (10 minutes)

- This morning we are going to spend some time exploring the Experiment stepping stone as part of the missional process. Remember the missional process is one of our four compass points and helps us navigate our way into God's future. (Show slide with LCM Process Graphic)
- The stepping stones of Envision, Experiment, and Evaluate are at the heart of our missional process and call us to continually be disrupted with new insights and then risk something new with God and one another. As we have shared from the beginning this process is never over because God is always doing something new in our midst.
- Experiments are how we enact or live into what we imagine in partnership with God and one another.
- We have engaged in missional practices to open our spiritual eyes to see ourselves, others, and our world as they are and as they could be. We called this prophetic imagination in Retreat 3.



### **Note to Facilitator:**






