


Please have music or music video playing as people gather



First, invite participants to spend a moment or two greeting one another at the tables.

Bring everyone back together with a few verses of "Alleluia" of "Spirit of the Living God"

Share the following introductory points:

- We gather in this place because "something not fully explainable but utterly transforming has occurred". What has become common, known, and even expected for us is still illusive for so many searching for meaning and connection in our world.
- Who will risk something new, allow their daily routine to be disrupted, awaken to God's movement nudging us toward others?
- Who will risk the invitation to loving community, to a relationship with the living Christ?
- Disruption . . . it is at the heart of the gospel it begins with encounter and sets us on a trajectory of seeing, hearing, and becoming something new!


How is the Holy Spirit disrupting me with new ways of seeing and being? WAY SOFS EEING

The Exploration Question for this session: (3 minutes)

Exploration Question:

How is the Holy Spirit disrupting me with new ways of seeing and being?

Ask if someone would be willing to begin this session with prayer.



Continue with the following points:

- We begin with a key principle of Leading Congregations in Mission Mission is Disruptive. Following God's movement is disruptive to our personal and congregational agendas!
- We are journeying together through a process of *Encounter, Envisioning, Discovery, and Experimentation*. At the heart of this process is **DISRUPTION** the yearnings of God for each of us that we might discover and risking living into God's future together.
- DISRUPTION is what tells us we are spiritually awake! It means we are picking up
 on the relational impulse of Christ moving us toward relationships of meaning,
 depth, and transformation.
- From Doctrine and Covenants 163:2b "Generously share the invitation . . ." Generously share the invitation . . . Generously share the invitation!
- The divine relational impulse to risk a new relationship, to risk sharing an invitation is DISRUPTIVE!
- Moving from a world of *fear and separation* to world of *hope and loving community* depends on this disruption and our response.



Dwelling on the video "Prayer of Disruption"

Share the video, provide a moment of silence, and ask the following question for discussion at tables. (15 minutes):

How do the words and images of the video connect with your faith journey?

Provide a few moments for large group reflection on this question.

- Luke 5, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people" - a glimpse of what could be if the disciples would risk something new.
- Jesus called the disciples to *move beyond their fears* and risk something new with him.
- The people Jesus invited were no different from you or me today.
- Their willingness to risk something new emerged after encountering and receiving Christ's peace as life giving and life DISRUPTING presence!

Share the following points:

- Jesus' invitation to his new disciples in Luke 5, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people" was a glimpse of what would be if the disciples would risk entering the depth of people's lives and *embody* hope and healing.
- Catching fish would be less risky than getting involved in the messiness of people's lives. However, Jesus called the disciples to move beyond their fears and risk something new with him.
- The people Jesus invited were no different from you or me today. They had no extraordinary gifts that qualified them for this adventure. Their willingness to risk something new emerged after encountering and receiving Christ's peace as life giving and life DISRUPTING presence!

Receive, Embody and Share Christ's Peace:

- We have received the invitation to Christ's peace a
 peace that provides assurance and disrupts us with a
 vision of what could be in our world.
- Sharing the Invitation to Christ's Peace has been and continues to be one of the more difficult missional challenges we face as a movement.


- We have forgotten at times the power that is resident in our shared stories.


Prayer of Disruption

Share the following points:

- In "Retreat 5 Receive, Embody, Share Christ's Peace", we discussed how a new approach to evangelism is critical in order for **the living Word to become real** for those who have walked away from both God and the church.
- We must continue to remind ourselves that the majority (as high as 85%) of Americans do not attend church. Entire generations of young people who are now adults grew up without ever attending a church.
- Our religious language and form or ways of doing church are entirely unfamiliar to the majority of the population. The notion that we can just keep improving what we are doing in our congregations in the hope that someone might stumble through our doors is totally unrealistic!
- Our contexts for mission in the U.S. and Canada now call for a radically different kind of church that engages in the places and spaces where people live, work, and play.
- Our contexts for ministry require <u>US</u> to move toward others as God first moved toward us in Jesus Christ!

Receive, Embody, Share Christ's Peace

- It is imperative that we fully explore and live into what it means to receive, embody, and share Christ's invitation or we will bypass the spiritual revival so desperately needed in our individual lives, congregations, neighborhoods, and world.
- Why? Because we don't need more evangelism programs or gimmicks, WE NEED AWAKENING— a spiritual awakening to the possibilities of how an ongoing relational engagement with our neighbors might change us, them, and our world!



Continue with the following points:

- As we discussed in Retreat 5, It is imperative that we fully explore and live into
 what it means to receive, embody, and share Christ's invitation or we will
 bypass the spiritual revival so desperately needed in our individual lives,
 congregations, neighborhoods, and world.
- Why? Because we don't need more evangelism programs or gimmicks, we need awakening – a spiritual awakening to the possibilities of how an ongoing relational engagement with our neighbors might change us, them, and our world!
- The resource entitled *Receive, Embody, and Share Christ's Peace* lays out a renewed vision for evangelism. Its foundation is built on our enduring principle *Worth of Persons* and our willingness to risk new relationships of invitation, hospitality, and healing outside the doors of our congregations!
- Receive, Embody, and Share Christ's Peace also draws from Doctrine and Covenants 162:2a, "Listen carefully to your own journey as a people, for it is a sacred journey and it has taught you many things you must know for the journey yet to come."

Receive, Embody, Share Christ's Peace

- Embodying the Invitation to Christ's peace is how we intentionally
 enter into relationships of meaning and depth. It is how we create the
 safe space that leads to conversations of significance about our lives,
 hopes, struggles, and the essence of our faith journey.
- When we risk new and deeper relationships, the Spirit creates
 opportunities for us to share our evolving faith story.
- Our stories are powerful and can change lives. As Jesus shared with his disciples in Matthew 13, "That's why I tell stories: to create readiness, to nudge the people toward receptive insight."

Continue with the following points:

- As we shared in Retreat 5, *embodying* the invitation to Christ's peace is how we
 intentionally enter into relationships of meaning and depth. It is how we create
 the safe space that leads to conversations of significance about our lives, hopes,
 struggles, and the essence of our faith journey.
- When we risk new and deeper relationships, the Spirit creates opportunities for us to share our *evolving faith story*. We are invited to trust that "My Spirit is reaching out to numerous souls even now and there are many who will respond..." (D&C 153:9b)

Note to Facilitator: Consider sharing a testimony of a time when someone's story significantly impacted your life.

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Share the following points:

So what do we mean by *evolving faith story*? Why is this important?

what is shaping me right now."

- Our faith story is unfolding... it is a LIVING RELATIONSHIP that has a past, present, and future. Consider a person who means a lot to you. How would you describe how that relationship has impacted your past, present, and future? Can we look at our relationship with God/Christ in this same way? What is a faith story a story about? It is about a relationship!
- What does it mean to discover and share your evolving faith story today? Different than "this is why I believe in Jesus" it is more about "let me share with you what really matters to me, what is the substance of my life, what is shaping me right now."

My Evolving Faith Story

- Not necessarily WHAT I BELIEVE Remember, this is where traditional evangelism begins and often ends - IT IS WHO I AM IN JESUS CHRIST- and who I am becoming?
- This impacts also HOW I SHARE my faith story. What can I share with others about who I am becoming in Jesus Christ and why that means something in my life?

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

Prayer for Peace

Leading Congregations in Mission - Retreat 6

CCS 164 - Prayer of Peace

Today's prayer for peace is a little different than usual. Today we don't pray for a nation or its people. We pray for a group, many of whom often feel as though they have no country: we pray for those who are without decent housing, without a home – the poorest among us.

While circumstances can vary...the main reason people experience homelessness is because they cannot find housing they can afford. It is the scarcity of affordable housing in the United States (and Canada), particularly in more urban areas where homelessness is more prevalent, that is behind their inability to acquire or maintain housing.

Child homelessness in the U.S. is on the rise, according to a report published last month by the National Center on Family Homelessness. The study showed that 2.5 million American children were homeless at some point in 2013 – one child in every 30, an all-time historical high for the United States.

About 15 percent of our homeless population is considered "chronically homeless" individuals, and about 9 percent of homeless people are veterans.

Families

Homeless families are similar to other poor families. Typically, families become homeless as a result of some unforeseen financial crisis - a medical emergency, a car accident, a death in the family - that prevents them from being able to hold on to housing.

Youth Young people often become homeless due to family conflict, including divorce, neglect, or abuse.

Veterans Often become homeless due to war-related disabilities. For a variety of reasons – physical disability, mental anguish, post-traumatic stress, etc. – many veterans find readjusting to civilian life difficult. Difficulties readjusting can give rise to dangerous behaviors, including addiction, abuse, and violence, which, coupled with the difficulties, can lead to homelessness.

Chronic Homelessness Chronic homelessness is often the public face of homelessness. "Chronic" has a specific definition, involving either long-term and/or repeated bouts of homelessness coupled with disability (physical or mental).

It's a common misconception that this group represents the majority of the homelessness population. Rather, they account for less than 15 percent of the entire homeless population on a given day.

Fortunately, there has been significant progress to address chronic homelessness in the last decade.

The way we speak of persons who find themselves in this situation matters. Often spoken of as less than human – being compared to feral cats or rats even by municipal officials, the term "homeless" has now become a label: "he is a homeless." What if we could use a term like "persons without homes" or even "friends without homes"?

As we prepare to offer our prayers on behalf of those who without housing, with marginal housing, without a home, let us hold these mothers and fathers, sons, daughters, sisters, brothers, friends, in our hearts.

for those sleeping under bridges, on park benches, in doorways or bus stations.

for those who can only find shelter for the night but must wander in the daytime.

for those who have no place to keep possessions that remind them who they are.

for those who are afraid and hopeless.

for those who have been betrayed by our social safety net.

for all these people, we pray that you will provide shelter, security and hope, which is to say, we pray you will help us to become your instruments of blessing in providing shelter, security, and hope.

May those of us with warm houses and comfortable beds not be lulled into complacency and forgetfulness.

And may we see the face of Jesus – who also experienced homelessness – in the eyes of every person without a home we meet so that we may be empowered through word and deed, and through the political means we have, to bring justice and peace for those persons who are without a home. Amen.

- The Blessings of Community is more than an enduring principle, it is a gift we have been given that will bring blessing to others. It is at the heart of discovering our identity and calling in Section 163:1.
- As we continue to live fully into our identity and calling as Community of Christ we must recover our passion for INVITING OTHERS into the Blessings of Community.


Share the following points:

- This morning we focused on our evolving faith stories as individuals and being prepared to share those stories as our relationships with others deepen and opportunities emerge.
- This afternoon we focus on our evolving faith story as a movement and being
 prepared to share our unfolding story. It is inextricably linked to our personal story
 and we will each bring unique insights as we share and invite others to experience
 Community of Christ.
- The *Blessings of Community* is more than an enduring principle, it is a gift we have been given that will bring blessing to others. It is at the heart of discovering our identity and calling in Section 163:1.

Note to Facilitator: Consider sharing a personal testimony about the Blessings of Community.

Continue with the following points:

- As we have shared in prior retreats, the highest expression of the gospel is lived out in relationship with others. The gospel can only be experienced in its fullness in relationship with others!
- In a world that is increasingly individual we must convey and live a deeply relational expression of the gospel in community – an expression that goes deeper than simply doing church but creates space for transformative encounter with God and one another!
- As we continue to live fully into our identity and calling as Community of Christ we must recover our passion for INVITING OTHERS into the Blessings of Community.



Refer participants to *Our Identity and Calling - The Key to Our Future (one page handout)*

Share the following points:

- We have an amazing story to live and share!
- As we continue to explore who we are becoming in Christ we are challenged to respond to the following essential question from D&C 163:1-

How do we discern, embrace, and risk living fully into our identity and calling as Community of Christ in a changing world?

- There a number of key words in this question including:
 - O Discern how do we encounter new insights?
 - Embrace how do we make space for these new insights even when they
 may be disruptive to our preconceived notions?
 - Risk Living how do we take initial steps to experiment with the insights as we try new ways of being disciples and the church?
 - Community how does the word Community draw from the well of our sacred story and point us in the direction of our future?
 - Christ who is the living Christ, the Word made flesh to us and how do we live and convey his world changing message today?
 - Changing World How do we relate our evolving ways of being and doing to neighborhoods, towns, and cities across Europe searching for meaning and connection?



• There is a lot in this question! This is the <u>PRIMARY ESSENTIAL QUESTION</u> that will lead us into the future. Doctrine and Covenants 163:1 reminds us, *If you will discern and embrace its message you will not only discover your future, you will become a blessing to the whole creation. Do not be afraid to go where it beckons you to go.*

Refer participants to What is Our Name Calling Us to Become?

- Have two readers alternate reading the quotes on pages 1 and 2 of this resource allowing 15 seconds between each reading. Ask participants to underline words or phrases that resonate with them during the readings.
- Refer to participants to the bottom of page 2. Provide 10 minutes for personal reflection on the quotes and first three questions. (consider playing some quiet reflective music)
- Refer participants to page 3 and invite them to discuss their responses to questions
 1, 2, and 3 at their table groups (25 minutes 8 minutes for each question). Let them know there will be time for large group sharing.
- Provide some time for large group sharing (10 to 15 minutes depending on time).

Note: It is important for the tables to share their initial responses to the questions so we can learn from one another. These are challenging questions and cannot be answered in one short session. These questions help us explore how we are beginning to discern and risk living into our identity and calling as Community of Christ in a changing world!

 - Relationships our deepest intellectual and spiritual longings to belong, to experience unconditional acceptance, and to walk life's journey in companionship with God and one another

- In each of the statements above, "our" refers to people inside and outside the church.





- As we have explored in prior retreats we are cultural interpreters that live and
 convey essential truths in ways that relate to a changing world. This is not new but is
 nevertheless very challenging!

- We have to *reintroduce* our nations to Jesus Christ and the church with *new language and form* that conveys the timeless underlying truths that have transformed us as *communities* of Christ!

- In addition to the challenge of public perception, we now have generations of adults who never shadowed the door of a church. Our rituals, language – everything is unfamiliar and even strange! It is like speaking English to a group that only understands Spanish. The majority of the population in the USA and Canada is no longer churched Christians. It is a strange, new world out there!
- We have to start over and see the USA and Canada in the same way we use to view other nations with respect to mission.
- We have to reintroduce our nations to Jesus Christ and the church with new language and form that conveys the timeless underlying truths that have transformed us as communities of Christ!
- This is challenging work especially during a time of transition when we are in that
 in between space between the ways things use to be and what is emerging in the
 western world.

- So instead of "church" we may use words like gathering, community of Christ followers, movement, loving community, sacred community, missional order, etc.
- Also think about how our identity and calling as Community of Christ invites us to
 describe and do church differently in order to connect with a changing world.
- The table and descriptions moving from left to right is way for us to take any word and begin to think about how it is perceived and how it can be expressed in new language (what we say) and form (what we do).

Note to Facilitator: We also included a **Glossary of Terms** in participants' packets. This glossary contains frequently used words in Community of Christ. They include how we define the word. This is provided for reference.

Take 5-7 minutes and ask for some examples from the table discussions.

Close with the following:

Consider dividing into teams and drawing words out of basket. Share the results of your work on newsprint and discuss insights gained as well as questions.





- How do we make room in our lives to ground ourselves more completely in the presence of God?

- Making Room is a practice designed to help us look back on our lives weekly to answer these questions. This practice is not about trying to squeeze more church activities into our lives or give more money.
- This practice is about saying no to what clutters our lives and yes to what brings us joy and purpose. For some of us the best way to increase our capacity for mission is to be more intentional about taking time for rest and renewal. For some it may be to finally put a plan together to reduce debt.






